

I want to tell you about a movie.

The movie is called *Avenue of the Giants*, and it comes from the heart. It tells a story that felt tremendously relevant when the idea for it surfaced nearly a decade ago. It's even more relevant right now.

I met Herbert Heller in 2014. I was told that as a child he had escaped Auschwitz. For anyone who knows about the history of World War II and the Nazi death camps, a statement like that seems inconceivable. "Nobody escaped Auschwitz," I thought.

But I learned that the trauma of Herbert's experience had, for decades, been kept a secret. This was the starting point for *Avenue of the Giants*. I invited Herbert to speak at my







son's school, and that event showed me that his story — sharing his story — could have a tremendous impact across the generations. Herbert was speaking to kids who were the same age that he was when he was taken into the camps by the Nazis, and you could hear a pin drop — with an 88-year-old man talking to 13-year-old boys and girls. It was remarkable. I thought, "This needs to be a film."

After years of hard work, it became one — a powerful film written by Finn Taylor with a heart-piercing screenplay and unforgettable performances from a cast that includes Stephen Lang, Elsie Fisher, Luke David Blumm, and Robin Weigert. We have shown *Avenue of the Giants* to packed houses at film festivals in both the Hamptons and Mill




Valley. It has received standing ovations, and it has prompted thoughtful questions and emotional expressions of gratitude from people in the audience. It is a movie that fosters curiosity, compassion, and healing. As the great poet and essayist Audre Lorde once put it, "I have come to believe over and over again that what is most important to me must be spoken, made verbal and shared, even at the risk of having it bruised or misunderstood." This is a movie about saying it out loud.

As we know, there are people who insist on denying that the Holocaust ever happened. Sharing Herbert Heller's story is a way of confronting that type of ignorance. Given the state of affairs in the world today and a







troubling surge of antisemitism around the globe, we believe that this movie is more important than ever. We see it as a vehicle for promoting empathy and understanding. It's a film that speaks to teens, too, who are grappling with an epidemic of suicide and a widespread mental health crisis. We all suffer, and we all seek a pathway out of suffering. That's what this movie is about.

That's why it exists.
